A bridge for engagement, the company builds understanding of different cultures within diverse, and often remote communities. THEATRE PRODUCTIONS

Tangle's touring theatre productions are international in ambition, looking to influences from Africa, the Caribbean and Europe.

The work is created with a distinctive aesthetic. Combining Southern African township theatre approaches with some Western techniques, productions re-imagine classic texts, using multiple languages with freshly commissioned music and song. These are illuminated using only practical lighting sources, fully integrated into visually powerful set designs. As actors perform as a tight ensemble, an incredible dynamism is established in the relationship between these performers and their audiences.

Tangle's work is flexible, designed to present in a vast range of settings – from traditional venues to schools and community centres, maximising engagement in remote areas.

WORKSHOP NEGATIVE (2016, Gate Theatre Notting Hill) marked the English premiere for Zimbabwe's leading writer and activist Cont Mhlanga. Performed in five languages, this controversial production was presented in traditional collective theatre form, mixing dramatic dialogue with physical theatre, combat sequences, poetry and song.

Wow. It was not just a terrific play but the direction seemed faultless. So fast paced yet absolutely clear, and covering so many critical themes. It was absolutely gripping. All our party was amazed.

DOCTOR FAUSTUS (2018, South West England and Arcola Theatre London) was an African reimagining of Marlowe's classic, performed by three actors in five languages, linked by original music and song.

Masterfully acted and directed. The atmosphere was breath taking, engrossing and thrilling.
Pure enchantment. To re-create Faustus with three actors requires outstanding performances and characterisation. A truly great acting achievement – well done!

NURTURING TALENT

Since founding Tangle has commissioned over 40 writers, visual artists and musicians, and supported the career development of more than 300 professional artists. By building their skills we are increasing the visibility of the sector and growing South West England's talent pool.

Our **Educator Training Programme**, delivered in partnership with Prime Theatre, gives emerging professionals the chance to train as practitioners. Participants then progress to deliver workshops in schools and communities throughout the year.

Our **Resident Artist Scheme** supports emerging directors, musicians, sound and lighting designers. Beneficiaries receive a cash bursary to develop skills in collaboration with our creative team.

Our **Tangle Company** touring project is a vital training ground for actors and singers to develop virtuoso skills. They learn to work as a tight ensemble, gaining valuable experience at an early career stage.

Tangle Café, our annual networking night, brings artists of all kinds together to meet, share ideas and experiences, and gain support.

Our **Artist Support Network** is a regular meeting point for those from across the live performance disciplines to discuss important issues, develop support strategies and collectively problem solve.

DEVELOPING THE SECTOR

Our 2013 investigative research project EVERYTHING MATTERS uncovered some of the blocks in nurturing African and Caribbean talent in South West England. The project launched a powerful network of organisations and galvanised a change in attitude. 2018 sees the launch of a new, four year project, EVERYONE COUNTS, exploring the barriers faced by emerging African and Caribbean theatre makers in off-stage roles.

EVERYONE COUNTS will shift the landscape for good practice in participation and recruitment, delivering practical outcomes in collaboration with arts organisations nationally.
